Key Messages

Making Strong Vaccine Progress in PA

- Pennsylvania is making significant vaccine progress with more than 4 million doses administered across the state.
- Nearly a quarter of Pennsylvanians have received at least one vaccine dose, and more than 12% are fully vaccinated.
- An analysis of CDC data last week put Pennsylvania second in the nation (behind New Mexico) for the number of vaccines administered per 100,000 people. Though these numbers change daily, it is one indicator that helps us see the major progress of our vaccine rollout.
- While vaccine demand is still higher than supply, we are on track to meet the national goal of opening vaccine eligibility to include all adults by May 1.
- We remain committed to get everyone in Phase 1A scheduled and then moving to Phase 1B in early April.
- The special initiative to get K-12 school staff vaccinated using the Johnson &
 Johnson vaccine is ahead of schedule and it is expected that the vast majority who
 want the vaccine will get theirs by the end of this month.
- The success of our vaccine rollout gives us hope, and a path back to our lives.

Updated Mask Guidance for Vaccinated People

- Pennsylvania has updated our mask guidance to follow the latest recommendations from the CDC.
- If you're fully vaccinated and you're getting together with others who are also fully vaccinated, you don't have to wear a mask or social distance.
- What that means from a practical standpoint is that if everyone is vaccinated, you can visit with friends and family.
- Research has shown that fully vaccinated people are less likely to have asymptomatic infection and potentially less likely to spread the virus that causes COVID-19 to others.
- However, there is still more to learn about how long protection lasts and how much vaccines protect against new variants of the virus, so some prevention measures will continue to be in place for all people, regardless of their vaccination status.
- That means you must continue to wear a mask when you're out in public, including when you visit a business.
- And if you're ever in doubt, wear a mask just to be safe.
- You are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after your second shot if you got Moderna or Pfizer vaccines.
- If you got the J&J vaccine, you're considered fully vaccinated two weeks after your single-dose shot.
- While masks may stay with us for a while, vaccines will help us get back to our lives.

Transportation to Vaccine Appointments

- As our communities prepare to open mass vaccination sites, transportation should not be a barrier to getting a vaccine.
- Public transit, often free or subsidized for older adults and people with disabilities, is available in every county.
- Our shared ride programs and fixed-route public transit systems offer accessible transportation
 - The Senior Shared Ride program offers Pennsylvanians 65+ shared-ride and curb-to-curb services for a fraction of the normal cost.
 - The Persons with Disabilities Program helps Pennsylvanians 18-64 who have disabilities to get transportation, too.
 - Free transportation to vaccinations is currently available in at least 39 counties for qualifying individuals.
- These transportation programs are removing barriers for some of our most vulnerable residents. Not just during the pandemic, but every day.
