

US Department of Energy SWIFt - PA Version

Under US DOE's first round of the Sustainable Wastewater Infrastructure of the Future (SWIFt) Initiative, SWIFt 1.0, DOE worked with 70+ facilities to reduce their average energy intensity by 8.1% and craft personalized energy management plans to reach 30% long-term energy savings. In SWIFt 2.0 DOE has two tracks – toolkit training and advanced energy technology – and EPO is taking the toolkit training to the next level.

By creating a partnership program for interested PA public WWTP, EPO is adding energy data analysis and the opportunity to shape future energy outreach to WWTP. For a limited number of committed partners in the toolkit track, a facility energy assessment will be provided.

As part of the agreement, energy contractors with municipal operations experience will have access to facility utility bill data and the plant to conduct the energy assessment. For these partners, EPO will commit to providing a report with an energy usage analysis, projected cost savings and incentives information, and projected costs and payback analytics. At this time there is a limit to the number of assessments that can be provided with DOE funding, so early sign-ups are encouraged.
