## House Bill 606 Promotes Responsible Use of Radar and Provides Motorist Protections

- In order to use radar, a municipality must adopt an ordinance authorizing its use within its boundaries.
- A municipality must install 4 or more official signs within 500 feet of its borders on 4 or more highways entering the municipality indicating radar is in use.
- Local law enforcement officers must complete a required training course approved by the State Police and the Municipal Officer's Education and Training Commission in order to use radar.
- Local law enforcement must utilize radar from a stationary point located within, or directly adjacent to, a clearly marked law enforcement vehicle in a location that is readily visible to the motoring public.
- A speeding motorist must be travelling at least 10 miles over the speed limit where the speed limit is less than 55 miles per hour and at least 6 miles over the speed limit where the speed limit is 55 miles per hour or more (except in a school zone or an active work zone).
- A speeding motorist must be at least 500 feet beyond a speed limit sign indicating a decrease of speed (except school zone, bridge and elevated structure, hazardous grade, or work zone speed limits).
- During the initial 90 days of speed enforcement using radar, speeding motorists can only be given written warnings.
- A municipality's share of revenue generated from the use of radar in a calendar year may not exceed 10% of the municipality's budget for that year. All excess revenue collected must be remitted to PennDOT for deposit into the Motor License Fund.
