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Modern Speed Detection: A Matter of Public Safety

Did you know Pennsylvania is the only state in the nation whose local police departments cannot use radar or other modern detection devices to control speeding on local roads? The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's most recent Report on <u>Crash Facts and Statistics</u> showed that 66,563 people were injured in reportable vehicle crashes. That factors to a rate of about 182 injuries each day. The vast majority of vehicle crashes happen on our local and secondary roads (noninterstate or turnpike) and speeding is the number one contributing factor.

Local use of radar could help to curtail these preventable crashes. It has helped in neighboring states. Maryland, Ohio, and Virginia permit local radar use, and all have lower traffic fatality rates than Pennsylvania. When local police lack access to radar, they are forced to rely on obsolete methods of speed enforcement. These alternatives are often time-consuming, resource-intensive, and less precise.

If the General Assembly does not act now, a stopwatch may soon be the only speed timing device available to our local police officers. This very unsettling development has and will continue to hinder local law enforcement operations across the Commonwealth and further endanger public safety.
